### Learning Strategies: Mind Mapping

As school curricula demand more and more critical thinking from students starting at low grades, it is important that kids are provided with necessary tools to tackle the challenges thrown at them in their homework. It is key for students to develop methods to think critically and organize their thoughts as early as first and second grade. One specific strategy is Mind Mapping, which is used specifically in high school and collegiate levels. This learning strategy is easily adaptable for younger ages and is a simple and well organized way to teach kids how to process information.

An article from the University of Adelaide Writing Center Learning Guide explains the uses of mind mapping, "Mind mapping was developed as an effective method for generating ideas by association. In order to create a mind map, you usually start in the middle of the page with the central theme/main idea and from that point you work outward in all directions to create a growing diagram composed of keywords, phrases, concepts, facts and figures. It can be used for assignments and essay writing especially in the initial stages, where it is an ideal strategy to map your 'thinking'. Mind mapping can be used for generating, visualizing, organizing, note-taking, problem-solving, decisionmaking, revising and clarifying your university topic, so that you can get started with assessment tasks. Essentially, a mind map is used to brainstorm' a topic and is a great strategy for students."


