Meeting Developmental Milestones

The Center for Disease Control and Prevention have listed helpful guidelines that may help you when observing your child's development. It is important to learn the signs and act early on any child that may be falling behind on age appropriate development. The milestones listed on their website cover children from 2 months to 5 years old. Each age has details regarding the development of social/emotional, language/communication, movement/physical, and cognitive milestones that you as a parent can observe as your child grows.

Developmental Milestones of a 4 year old

Social and Emotional

- Plays "Mom" and "Dad"
- Often can't tell what's real and what's make-believe
- Talks about what she likes and what she is interested in

Language and Communication

- Knows some basic rules of grammar, such as correctly using "he" and "she"
- Tells stories
- Can say first and last name

Movement and Physical

- Knows some basic rules of grammar, such as correctly using "he" and "she"
- Tells stories
- Can say first and last name

Cogntive

- Starts to understand time
- Understands the idea of "same" and "different"
